Toss Ups

1. For ten points, what French author is known for short stories with ironic twist endings, such as *The Necklace* and *A Piece of String*?

Guy **De Maupassant**

2. Following this battle, Augustus Caesar became sole leader of the Roman Empire. In it, Agrippa defeated the combined naval forces of Marcus Antonius and Cleopatra. FTP, identify this 31BC naval battle.

Battle of **Actium**

3. Despite continual injuries to his leg muscles and knees, this baseball player led the American League six times in runs scored, four times in home runs, and once in batting. He was named most valuable player in the American League in 1956, 1957, and 1962. For ten points, who was this New York Yankee and Hall of Fame Member who was born on October 20, 1931.

Mickey **Mantle**

4. Named for the winner of the 1903 Nobel Prize in Chemistry, identify, for ten points, the SI unit for radioactivity.

Becquerel

5. From 1882 to 1889 he edited the *Civil and Military Gazette*, and most of his works are set in India and Burma during the British colonial period. Name the winner of the 1907 Nobel Prize in Literature, the author of such works as *Kim*, *Just So Stories*, *Captain's Courageous*, and, for ten points, *The Jungle Book*.

Rudyard **Kipling**

6. "I smell pork cutlets," wrote Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart to his wife. Days later, he was dead. New evidence concerning the composer's demise points to an illness whose symptoms were fever, rash, limb pain, and swelling. For ten points, what is this sickness, caused by eating undercooked pork?

trichinosis

7. It is an oval-shaped organ located on the left of the abdomen. It filters damaged red blood cells from the blood and recycles the iron from the hemoglobin while acting as a red blood cell reservoir and producer of white blood cells. FTP, name this constituent of the lymphatic system.

Spleen

8. The title object is a type of sherry, which one of the characters requests to taste. For ten points, in which Poe short story does Montresor get Fortunato drunk and lure him into the cellar where Fortunato is buried alive?

The Cask of Amantillado

9. Though he is a British composer, he is best known for his compositions based on Hindu literature and English folk song. His important works before 1912 are settings of Brahman scriptures. His most frequently performed work is an orchestral suite based on the astrological symbols for planetary bodies. For ten points, who is the composer of The Planets?

Gustav **Holst**

10. His primary economic contribution was his extension of the labor theory of value to its conclusion, the theory of surplus value, which is outlined in one of his works. Also included in *Das Kapital* is the theory that Western capitalism will fall to its own economic system. FTP, identify this co-author of *The Communist Manifesto*.

Karl **Marx**

11. This college was the first college to be established in the US. Name the college that was founded by the Great and General Court of the Massachusetts Bay Colony and opened for instruction two years later.

Harvard

12. If you squeeze a balloon, the balloon eventually pops because of the increased pressure. This is an example of what gas law, which states that $PV = k$ (READ: p times v equals k)?

Boyle's Law

13. U. S. Navy research determined in 1969 that a defective boiler was responsible for an explosion on this ship which was sent to the port of Havana in December of 1897 and sank on the night of February 15, 1898. For ten points, what ship is remembered as the battle cry of the Spanish-American War?

USS Maine

14. What artist, whose real name is Alissandro Philipepi (AL-is-SAN-dro FI-li-PE-PI), is famous for such works as *Primavera* and, FTP, *The Birth of Venus*?

Sandro **Botticelli**

15. He was actually working on an anti-flu vaccine when he and his colleagues developed what this scientist is now remembered for. Who was this epidemiologist, developer of the first vaccine against polio?

Jonas **Salk**

Category Bonuses

During this section of the round, you will hear five toss up questions that will count ten points each. The player who answers the question correctly will give the team the opportunity to choose from six categories of bonus questions. There are two bonus questions per category and they count ten points each. The bounce back rule is in effect. Should the team not be able to answer the question, the other team will have the opportunity to answer. Answers from the opposing team must be immediate!

This year the bonuses are labeled with the name of a movie. The bold face word or words in the title of the movie will give you a clue as to what the bonus is about, so choose carefully. For example, a bonus titled An American Werewolf in **Paris**, in which Paris is in bold print, would have something to do with the city of Paris or any related cities named Paris. Have fun with this section.

(**Note to Reader:** Give each team a copy of the bonus categories before advancing in this round. Be sure to mark off a category as it is used.)

If neither team correctly answers the toss-up, then the bonus questions will be up for grabs on the next question.

Robin Hood:

Toss Ups

1. He was born 30 November 1835, in Florida, Missouri. He later served as a volunteer soldier in the Confederate cavalry before joining his brother in the Nevada territory for a career in silver mining. In 1865 he reworked a tale he had heard in the California gold fields, and within months the author and the story, “The Celebrated Jumping Frog of Calaveras County”, became national sensations. Give the birth name of this author, whose pseudonym is a Mississippi River phrase meaning two fathoms deep.

Samuel Langhorne **Clemens** (accept Mark Twain on early response before “birth name” is read)

2. Its name is very mismatched, as the ion of this element is in fact a very strong base. Discovered in 1774, its discoverer, Joseph Priestley, gave it a name which translates as “acid-forming.” FTP, identify this diatomic gas with atomic number 8 and symbol O.

Oxygen (accept O on early buzz)

3. He was born in New York in 1882, and his art is characterized by an attention to light and shade. A recurring theme of his art is lonely street scenes, buildings, and interiors, as shown in his 1930 painting, *Early Sunday Morning*. For ten points, identify this painter of the 1942 work *Nighthawks*.

Edward **Hopper**

4. His first inaugural was the first to be held outdoors, and his second started the tradition of the Marine Band playing at the inauguration. He himself was the first senator to become President. For ten points, identify this president whose term lasted from 1817 to 1825 and saw such events as the Rush-Bagot (BA-go) Treaty and the Spanish secession of Florida to the United States.

James **Monroe**

5. This Hungarian composer studied with the composers Salieri and Czerny. At the age of 16, he was welcomed into the same circle as Berlioz. Who is this composer famous for his piano music such as Hungarian Rhapsodies and his Faust Symphony?

Franz **Liszt**
