**Toss Ups**

1. It is 700 miles in area, and is about 40 miles long and 25 miles wide. For ten points, what is this largest lake in the Southern United States, which is located in Florida?

Lake **Okeechobee**

2. It was taken apart by the Knights of Saint John in 1402 to build a castle. While it stood, it was a 140-foot tall marble structure, with a sarcophagus supported by 36 columns, topped with a stepped pyramid capped off with a marble chariot. FTP, identify this tomb, located at Halicarnassus, named for the man buried within.

**Mausoleum** of Halicarnassus

3. It originates in the blood's plasma. What is this clear, colorless fluid known for cleaning up the blood in the body?

**Lymph**

4. He chronicled the struggle of Greece against a foreign invader in his *A History of the Persian Wars*. FTP, identify this man, considered by many to be the father of history.

**Herodotus**

6. When asked who the three greatest generals in history were, he replied "Besides myself, Napoleon and Alexander the Great." A rival of Patton, this is, FTP, what British general who commanded British forces in North Africa to victory against Erwin Rommel?

Bernard **Montgomery**

7. This is one of the elements whose properties were accurately predicted by Dmitri Mendeleev, and was discovered in 1875 by Paul Lecoq de Boisbaudran (bwa-beau-dran). FTP, identify this element, located just below Aluminum, with atomic number 31 and symbol Ga.

**Gallium**

8. His research led him to study tidal fluctuations and fluid dynamics. However, he is best remembered for his contributions to mathematics, which include developing spherical trigonometry, the theory of differential equations, and the calculus of variations. FTP, identify this mathematician most famous for his transcendental number,  $e$ .

Leonhard **Euler** (pronounced oiler, but be kind)

9. Originally named Crenides, it was renamed after the king when the Macedonians took it over. The city is most famous for being the battlefield on which Mark Antony and Octavian defeated Marcus Junius Brutus and Gaius Cassius Longinus. What is the name of this city which is a major setting in Shakespeare's play *The Tragedy of Julius Caesar*?

10. What Virginia born author is known for her works about Midwestern immigrants in such novels as *My Antonia* and *FTP Death Comes for the Archbishop*?

Willa **Cather**

11. He formulated the Law of Independent Assortment and the Law of Segregation. Born in the Czech Republic, he became a substitute teacher, and later a monk. Who is this man known now as the father of genetics?

Gregor **Mendel**

12. What Iowa-born regional painter painted *Daughters of the American Revolution*, but is probably better remembered, FTP, for *American Gothic*?

Grant **Wood**

13. This song reached the top of the charts on October 20, 1962 and stayed there for two weeks. However, it will not go away. For ten points, what is this beastly tune by Bobby "Boris" Picket that resurrects itself every Halloween?

The **Monster Mash**

14. Ashurbanipal built a great library during his rule of this ancient civilization. A war-faring race, the civilization was defeated by an alliance of its enemies. What is this ancient group of people whose capital was at Ninevah?

**Assyrians**

15. This tissue in vascular plants is made up of many sieve tubes. For 10 points, name this type of vascular tissue that carries the food made during photosynthesis from the leaves to the roots, fruits, or buds of the plant.

### Category Bonuses

For example, a bonus titled An American Werewolf in **Paris**, in which Paris is in bold print, would have something to do with the city of Paris or any related cities named Paris. Have fun with this section.

(**Note to Reader:** Give each team a copy of the bonus categories before advancing in this round. Be sure to mark off a category as it is used.)

If neither team correctly answers the toss-up, then the bonus questions will be up for grabs on the next question.

### Toss Ups

1. Under his reign, Parliament had little activity while he consolidated his rule, meeting for only ten months out of 24 years. In 1486 he married Elizabeth of York, thus unifying the Lancastrian and Yorkist houses. For ten points, identify this king, reigning from 1485 to 1509, whose dynasty, continued through his son, includes such rulers Edward VI, Mary I, and Elizabeth I..

**Henry VII**

2. This region of the ocean has the greatest depth, generally greater than 1000 meters. Biological activity is typically rare. Light does not penetrate the water, for the depth and pressure are tremendous. What is this ocean region that represents about 250 million square kilometers of the Earth's surface?

**Abyssal zone**

3. His first novel, Poor Folk, tells the unhappy story of a government clerk. In his novel The House of the Dead he described the sadistic beatings, filthy conditions, and lack of privacy in Russian prisons. FTP, identify this author of The Idiot, The Possessed, Crime and Punishment, and The Brothers Karamazov.

4. He was born in Paris, the son of professional musicians. His father a singing teacher and composer; his mother, an excellent pianist. When he was 9 he was enrolled in the Paris Conservatory. His last and best known opera, was performed 37 times during its first season. At his untimely death at the age of 37, who is this composer of Carmen?

5. Known to the Romans as *Mare Nostrum*, which means our sea, this sea is divided into eastern and western basins by an undersea sill. For ten points, name this sea on which important coastal cities such as Genoa, Trieste, Haifa, Marseilles, and Barcelona lie..
