22. The Beatles song "I am the Walrus" is based on the poem "The Walrus and the Carpenter" by which Oxford mathematician and author also known for his poem, "The Jabberwocky"?

23. A part of Greece since 1918, it has also been ruled by the Romans, Byzantines, Venetians, and the Turks. What is this island whose current capital is Canea, but whose ancient capital was the Minoan city of Knossos?

24. Born Jerome Van Aken, this Dutch/Flemish painter of the 15th and 16th centuries is said to be the forerunner of surrealism. Name this painter of "The Temptation of St. Anthony" and "The Garden of Earthly Delights."

25. He first defined the term "element", saying it was a substance that couldn't be broken down into smaller substances. Who is this Irish co-founder of the British Royal Society famous for his law describing the behavior of gases?

26. Its recovery was the chief aim of the 3rd Crusade after it was taken by Saladin in 1187. In 1191, under the leadership of Richard the Lionhearted, the crusaders recaptured the city. Name this city, the Christians major military stronghold in the Holy Land.

27. He was born Thomas Woodward and was described by British columnist Cassandra as "sweat personified." He had a minor success with the theme from the James Bond film, *Thunderball*. Who is this 1960s and 70s pop icon known for his sexy stage movements and the songs, "It's Not Unusual" and "What's New Pussycat?"
